DISSERTATION

Title: *Three Essays on Government and Rebel Interactions*

Committee: Hein Goemans (advisor), Kevin Clarke, and Bethany Lacina

Summary: In my dissertation, I focus on reputations and internal conflicts. In one essay, I consider what factors affect a reputation for resolve by structurally estimating a model of bargaining and reputation. I find that democracies suffer from a reputation disadvantage prior to conflict, but this reputation gap between democracies and autocracies reverses once conflict is under way. This finding reconciles two major literatures on whether democracies can develop reputations for resolve. In papers two and three, I consider how reputation concerns affect the behavior of domestic terrorists. Across both essays, I find that terrorists attack more during periods of right-wing government and that attacks during these periods build their reputations more than attacks during left-wing rule.
