RESEARCH PROFILE

[Research synopsis](#) — My research centers on social demography and stratification that cross-cut the disciplines of demography, sociology, economics and political science. In the late 1990s and 2000s theory and research highlighted important, and relatively poorly understood, trends with respect to the transition to adulthood, the transition to low (and even lowest, low) fertility, and changing patterns of stratification, particularly as it affected young people. From this backdrop, my research centred on 1) Transition to adulthood 2) Life course analysis, 3) Poverty and youth disadvantage, 4) Consequences of demographic events, and 5) Fertility. The European comparative perspective is a common theme in my research, and starting with the transition to adulthood, I was one of the first to put demographic trends into the perspective of welfare regime classification. The ERC advanced grant extended this line of research by bringing in cultural beliefs and institutional rigidity. The most recent research (Horizon Europe collaborative project) extends this further by integrating the concept of resilience, with a particular focus on ageing and increased uncertainty, and as such, this line of research is in line with the 2023 State-of-the-Union theme: "Building Europe in a Time of Uncertainty".
